Door Cosmos presents a traveling exhibition of sacred art from Nepal featuring traditional thangka paintings, mandalas, and contemporary Nepalese works. Through art, storytelling, and cultural context, the exhibition invites visitors into a world where spirituality, beauty, and daily life remain deeply intertwined.

Drawing on experiences gained while living and traveling in Nepal, collector and curator Will Carpenter shares stories of the people, places, and traditions behind the artwork. Visitors encounter not only the paintings themselves, but also the culture, values, and spirit from which they emerged.

The exhibition is designed to remain installed for an extended period, typically one month or longer. Opening receptions may include a presentation on Nepal and the story behind the collection, as well as an optional demonstration of traditional singing bowls.

While many of the artworks draw upon Buddhist and Hindu traditions, the exhibition explores universal themes of compassion, peace, and the simplicity of being that bridges differences of culture, time, and place.
